CMS advises BayWa AG on investing in wholesale supply of photovoltaic systems

Munich – BayWa AG has taken a 70% stake in Tecno Spot GmbH, a wholesaler of photovoltaic systems headquartered in Bruneck (Italy, South Tyrol), via a BayWa subsidiary. The vendor is Gremes GmbH, which will continue to hold 30% of the shares in Tecno Spot GmbH. The current CEO, Gert Gremes, will continue to manage the business. The acquisition is currently awaiting approval from the competition authorities.
